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1. ABOUT HUMSAFAR:

HUMSAFAR, a Support Centre for Women in Crisis was set up in November 2003 in Lucknow, Uttar Pradesh, **to ensure a holistic response to women's human rights violations.** It is collectively managed by a group of activist volunteers. Currently it is registered as a Trust in Lucknow.

The Centre has provided a wide variety of support services to **8330** women survivors (from November 2003 to March 2017). The support includes paralegal, legal, medical, social mediation, counseling, rescue, shelter and rehabilitation. Often it is a struggle for women in Uttar Pradesh to access the police system for justice. Over the years HUMSAFAR has enabled many women to register their cases with the police.

To create an enabling environment for gender equality and equity HUMSAFAR also works in 30 communities and 20 schools and colleges of Lucknow division which includes districts Lucknow, Unnao, Sitapur and Hardoi.

1.1 VISION: HUMSAFAR envisions a just world without gender-based discrimination and violence where violence survivors can access justice to live empowered lives with rights and dignity and to work with society to recognize and challenge violence.

1.2 MISSION: HUMSAFAR works in a feminist perspective to prevent gender based discrimination and violence by creating an enabling environment. It helps violence survivors make informed choices within a rights framework to access justice and rebuild their lives and reclaim their rights.

1.3 OBJECTIVES:

The objective of HUMSAFAR is to ensure a holistic response to women's human rights violations in Uttar Pradesh. Within this larger objective, the sub-objectives of HUMSAFAR are -

- To provide or arrange for necessary psycho-social, paralegal, medical, shelter and other types of support to women survivors of violence in Uttar Pradesh, using human rights principles.
- To provide support to other women's crisis support centers in the state and elsewhere who may need assistance for their casework.
- To initiate alliances with state mechanisms e.g. Police, to provide support to survivors using human rights principles.
- To engage larger civil society in understanding and addressing VAW in their regular capacity as citizens, workers, neighbors, teachers, students and so on.

- To create a platform for organizations working on women's human rights violations in the state of Uttar Pradesh for building a common understanding on how to address VAW using human rights principles.

2. MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS (*April 2016 To March 2017*)

- In the year 2016 till 2017, HUMSAFAR intervened in **450** cases of VAW survivors. In most of these cases women were facing domestic violence from their spouse and his family. HUMSAFAR helped women file cases under the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act (2005) PWDVA.
- In the year 2016-2017, HUMSAFAR was nominated for the Hindustan Times's '**Women of Substance**' category by Dr. Shruti Shadolikar, Vice Chancellor of Bhatkhande University and HUMSAFAR won the award.
- Government of Uttar Pradesh awarded HUMSAFAR the prestigious '**Rani Laxmi Bai Award**.'

- **Nayee Umange Nayee Pehchan Mahilaonke Haunslo ko Salaam:** HUMSAFAR trained another batch of 7 women for e-rickshaw drivers.
 - In April 2016 HUMSAFAR was registered under Section 80G of the **Income Tax Act** and also registered under the **Foreign Contribution Regulation Act**.
 - Former Chief Minister Of Uttar Pradesh, Akhilesh Yadav, had changed its policy stating that preference should be given to violence survivors while distributing free of cost e rickshaws to women under the government's livelihood programme.
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3. HUMSAFAR ACTIVITIES: HUMSAFAR undertook many activities in collaboration with ASHA and also independently. A description of activities is given below:-

3.1 Working with Violence Survivors:

HUMSAFAR's primary work is casework of women and girls struggling against gender based discrimination and violence. The casework unit's activities centers around providing a wide variety of support services to women such as paralegal, legal, social mediation, counseling, rescue, safe shelter, rehabilitation etc.

During the last one year (April 2016 to March 2017) HUMSAFAR has enabled many women to register and fight their cases. During this year HUMSAFAR intervened in a total **450** cases. The break up is as follows:

1. **102** new survivors approached HUMSAFAR.
2. HUMSAFAR followed up **184** existing cases during this period.
3. Legal as well as telephonic advice and other relevant information was provided to **66** cases.

4. Another **98** cases were provided assistance during mediation at the weekly sessions at the Lucknow SSP/DIG office.
5. HUMSAFAR has successfully resolved **18** cases through social mediation during this period.
6. Help of the police was sought to resolve **17** cases.
7. **5** survivors decided to walk out of abusive relationships.
8. One survivor convinced her family not to force her into remarrying and allow her to continue her education.
9. One survivor persuaded her family not to press for an early marriage of her sister.

3.1.1 Number of cases registered under the following law and act:

- Registered First Information Report (FIR) in police stations under sections of Indian Penal Code and Dowry Prohibition Act 1961, (IPC 498a, 323, 506, 504 and DPA 3/4): 17cases.
- Cases of maintenance, restitution of conjugal rights, Divorce cases Domestic Violence: 13 cases
- 5 survivors decide to file divorce case.

3.1.2 Place of violence:

During the last one year, **102** new survivors approached HUMSAFAR. In most incidents violence took place in the marital family where she was staying with in-laws. (**52**), although some of the survivors faced violence in the natal family (**13**) as well. Some (**18**) survivors faced violence in nuclear families. Another (**12**) survivors faced violence in public places and (**4**) survivors faced violence in her own house and at relative's house.

3.1.3 How cases are referred :

- It was HUMSAFAR's achievement that survivors satisfied with our services referred **40** new cases.
- Survivors referred from HUMSAFAR's School Program.: **3**
- Referred through our Community Outreach Programme: **12**.
- Cases approaching HUMSAFAR by the sign board, Internet and News Paper: **8**
- Referred by HUMSAFAR's alliance & partner organizations: **21**
- Referred by Police: **6**
- Referred by Trustees: **2**

3.2.2. Police Public Program- Interaction with Sakhi Samooh members: A Public Police Programme was conducted on August 11, 2017, with participation from community women and Sakhi Samooh members. A discussion was held on Violence against Women. Women raised questions about police behavior on women's issues in their locality. The policemen gave assurance to register First information Report on violence against women cases.

3.3. Motivating teachers and Students to Challenge VAW:

At present HUMSAFAR works in 20 schools & colleges of 4 districts of Uttar Pradesh (Lucknow, Unnao, Hardoi and Sitapur). HUMSAFAR facilitates training sessions with students by using a 12 session interactive module (Sath-Sath by Avehi Abacus). After the completion of the module HUMSAFAR engages them in activities like poster-making competition, slogan writing & essay writing competitions in order to gauge their understanding of the issues. HUMSAFAR also organizes film shows on gender issues. The impact of these sessions is that the youth is sensitized on gender issues.(refer cases of HUMSAFAR)

Major activities of HUMSAFAR 2016-17:

- **Yuvti Mela:** HUMSAFAR organized a Yuvti Mela in collaboration with Akshara from Mumbai and Asha Trust. This one-day activity was conducted in AP Sen Girls Degree College on September'29. There were 10 stalls on various facets of gender . There was one stall on reproductive health issue. The panel of celebrities who jointly inaugurated the Yuvti Mela included the first woman President of Allahabad University Richa Singh, Stop Acid Attack campaign convener Alok Dixit, Radio City RJ Amir, active community leader from Barooura locality Afroz and Urmila from Akshara organization. Students from 3 other colleges also participated in the mela which saw the participation of approximately 700 young girls in this event. A major impact of this intervention was that the college soon set up its own Anti sexual harassment cell.

- **Youth Convention (Meri Azaadi, Mera Chayan):** December'01, HUMSAFAR organized a Youth Convention in which 1000 young boys and girls from four Districts of Lucknow division participated. The panelists of this convention included Aisha a young videographer from Sanatkada, Sabika Abbas Naqvi of Delhi's Pinjara Todh campaign, Dr. Kush Kumar Singh and Faisal from Khudai Khidmatgar, Alok Dixit and Laxmi from Stop Acid Attack campaign and independent journalist Neha Dixi who anchored the event. In the interactive session, the participating youth asked questions on a range of topics including the right to choice to enter and exit relationships, freedom of movement, significance of plurality and diversity, etc. The interactive session helped introduce many concepts to the youth from the relatively smaller towns like the gender discrimination of curfew hours in even elitist educational institutions, the concept of 'Living In ' and how inter caste and inter-religion friendships broke social taboos.
- **Interaction with youth from communities:** Taking the model HUMSAFAR has started session of intensive interaction with youth from communities using the Sath Sath module.

3.3.1. Yuva Tarang: (Platform of young active volunteers): The formation of **Yuva Tarang** is the culmination years of work with youth and is slowly evolving as a vibrant platform. Now the youth are raising their voices on social issues e.g. Gender Discrimination, Early and Child marriage, Violence against Women and Sexuality. A positive impact of this has been that two active women volunteers have managed to convince their families to postpone their marriages and allow them to continue with their education.

3.3.2. Activities of Yuva Tarang: At present more than 350 youth are associated **Yuva Tarang** support HUMSAFAR in various ways. Some of the activities are as follows:

- Five meetings were held with the members of **Yuva Tarang** mainly to solicit their support for HUMSAFAR's programmes and deepen their understanding of gender, sexuality, early and forced marriage and various aspects of gender-based discrimination and violence. The meetings were held on April 9, July 11, September 30, November 24, 2016 and February 15, 2017.
- Many opportunities and a useful platform have been provided to members of **YuvaTarang**, They have participated in two **Leadership Workshops**.
- **Yuva Tarang** members actively participated in various protests to implement the **Right to Education**.
- **Yuva Tarang** members have initiated protests on issues of violence against women and gender issues.
- **Yuva Tarang** members benefitted from a 3-day training (September 24-26, 2016) , facilitated by the staff of Akshara (Mumbai) to help Yuva Tarang members to confidently carry out their duties as facilitators at the stalls at the Yuvti Mela.

3.3.2. Friends of HUMSAFAR: Group of concerned professionals

- A large number of concerned professionals including lawyers, doctors, businessmen, media professionals, home-makers, teachers and school principals are involved with HUMSAFAR.
- HUMSAFAR has received donation from professionals for conducting livelihood training of women.
- HUMSAFAR received donation from Dr. Pooja Ramakant (Rs 60,000), Dr. Gaurav Pandey (Rs 30,000), Film maker Imtiaz Ali (Rs 25000), Syed Asimul Haq (Rs. 5,200), Jasvinder Singh Ahuja (Rs. 1,00,000), AK Singh (Rs 11,00), Amod Kumar (Rs 50,000), Rohit Gupta (Rs 10,000), Srinivas Nagachandra (Rs 45,000) and , CVR Murty (Rs 5000).
- College principals/ teachers associated with HUMSAFAR are continuously supporting our outreach programme in educational institutions.

3.4. Livelihood:

Taking a holistic view of the survivors' situation, HUMSAFAR team had observed that a woman often delays the decision to come out of an abusive relationship due to her being ill-equipped to rebuild her life. In many cases survivors decide to withdraw their legal case and return to face violence due to their precarious financial situation.

HUMSAFAR decided to equip such violence survivors with a marketable skill which also breaks the stereotypical concept of women being technologically challenged. It was with this in mind that HUMSAFAR trained violence survivors as E rickshaw and auto rickshaw drivers to provide a safe and environmentally friendly public transport for women and girls. The driving training was supplemented by self-defense training, basic motor repair skills, communication skills, reading of road maps as well as an understanding of gender rights and empowerment..

This women operated transport service pioneered by HUMSAFAR has become a milestone in Uttar Pradesh. It is a usefully service with a powerful message that women violence survivors can not only turn a new leaf in their lives but can become a shining example of bravery and courage for others.

This year HUMSAFAR has trained 7 more e-rickshaw drivers. Now there are 14 e-rickshaw drivers.

3.5. Campaign and Network:

3.5.1. Aman Network Global Voices for Peace in Homes: HUMSAFAR holds responsibility of holding the secretariat of AMAN - a network which focuses on

advocacy for effective implementation of PWDVA, 2005. Under this initiative it is nurturing women's groups of Uttar Pradesh. HUMSAFAR has created a Facebook page of Aman Network Uttar Pradesh. We have also posted 1000 post card to the Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister demanding an effective implementation of the PWDV Act. HUMSAFAR provided support to AALI for organizing a **Jan Sunwai** on 30 November 2016 on cases of Domestic Violence. In this **Jan Sunwai** of 15 cases made presentations. HUMSAFAR organized 4 meetings of the network's Uttar Pradesh partners on June 17, August 19, October 7 and November 17, 2016. Around 22 organizations from Uttar Pradesh are now members of this network.

3.5.2. Bano Nayee Soch: During the 16 - days of activism this year OXFAM launched this campaign which talks about discrimination between men and women. HUMSAFAR undertook signatures on the affidavit from 1000 people. During this campaign we reached out to 1500 people.

3.5.3. Rozi Roti Adhikar Abhiyaan' (Campaign for food security and livelihood): HUMSAFAR has been holding the Uttar Pradesh-level secretariat of the '**Rozi-Roti AdhikaarAbhiyaan'** Around 80 partner organizations which includes frontal organizations of Left wing political parties, representative of women and *dalit* organizations across the state are active participants of the campaign making it one of the most effective pressure group on the crucial issue of entitlements in the state.

The main agenda of the campaign is to ensure the effective implementation of the National Food Security Act (NFSA). HUMSAFAR also provides logistic support and helps mobilize partners for various advocacy events at the local and national level. Framed in the feminist perspective the campaign spearheaded by HUMSAFAR is part of the larger women's movement which is working towards establishing linkages between gender-based discrimination and issues of entitlement mainly empowering women to access their right to livelihood and food.

Campaign Activities:

- Series of meetings have been organized: Meetings were held on June 4, August 24, October 5 & 18, November 5 & 8, December 30, 2016 and March 28, 2017. The main purposes of these meetings were to include names of eligible family members in the ration cards.

- Posted 2000 post cards addressed to the Prime Minister of India for effective implementation of the National Food Security Act.
- Participated in the national level meeting on Right to Food held in New Delhi on July 26-27, 2016.
- Participated in national level meeting on Right to Food held in New Delhi on March 16-17, 2017.
- Staff and community level volunteers attended the National Convention of Right to Food held in Ranchi on September 23-25, 2016.
- HUMSAFAR conducted a state-level convention on November 11-12, 2016. Funds were raised to hold the convention through donations collected from active community members, violence survivors, E-rickshaw drivers and members of the civil society organizations at large.
- Organized state level protest on NFSA issues on September 21, 2016 at Lucknow. In this protest stiff state opposition was experienced.

3.5.4. UP Mein Mahilaon Kee Awaz: A state level network has been built to raise voices against all forms of violence against women. In this network a series of meetings have been held. The members of this network represent women's organizations and are individuals as well. Members from other state are also part of this network. The major activities of this network included a visit to Nagpur on March 10, 2017 to participate in the activities on the occasion of Savitri Bai Phuley's birthday celebrations. Pamphlets about the event was distributed in various colleges and communities of Lucknow, Hardoi and Unnao districts.

3.6. Resource Centre Activities: Apart from these collaborative activities, HUMSAFAR functions as a Resource Centre on Violence against Women and gender based discrimination.

This year HUMSAFAR further engaged networks/ organizations through campaigns & joint events deepening their understanding of gender and gender-based discrimination. As a resource centre HUMSAFAR undertook the following programmes/ activities:-

Facilitated training/ sessions:

- On April 4, 2016, HUMSAFAR conducted a one-day training session with 25 **Sakhi Samooh** members. Gender, gender roles, violence against women, and their roles as a Sakhi Samooh were discussed. The major impact of this training was strengthening of the group.
- HUMSAFAR conducted leadership training with 40 youth on May 19-20, 2016. Discussions were held on media, communalism and blog writing. Among the facilitators of the training were Magsaysay award winner Dr Sandeep Pandey,

journalist-blogger Alka Pande, journalist-researcher Nasiruddeen Haider and activist Hameeda.

- Continuing its ongoing engagement with the police, HUMSAFAR conducted one day workshop with 80 police officers on May 28, 2016. This included, officers (sub inspector and inspector level) from all police stations of Lucknow. HUMSAFAR unpackaged the ‘Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005’ for the police. UN Consultant and advocate Risha Syed and Dr. Sandeep Pandey conducted this workshop. The SSP Lucknow provided the auditorium on the Police Lines campuses to conduct the training.
- HUMSAFAR conducted a 2-day workshop with teachers in collaboration with District Institutes of Education and Training (DIET) and ASHA on July 29-30, 2016. Around .45 teachers from various schools/ colleges from Lucknow district participated. The resource person for this workshop was Simantini Dhuru from Avehi Abacus who has more than 20 years of experience of working with education institutions. During the sessions the Sath-Sath module was discussed. The workshop was conducted in the DIET campus.
- HUMSAFAR conducted a 2 -day ‘Leadership workshop’ with 60 youth from different communities from Lucknow on August 6-7 2016. The workshop discussed issues covered under the Sath-Sath module. Like Gender, Patriarchy, etc.
- On August 12, 2016, we were requested by 1090 (Women Power Line) officer in charge for conducting a workshop with 1000 young girls in Faizabad on Gender, Domestic Violence and Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005.
